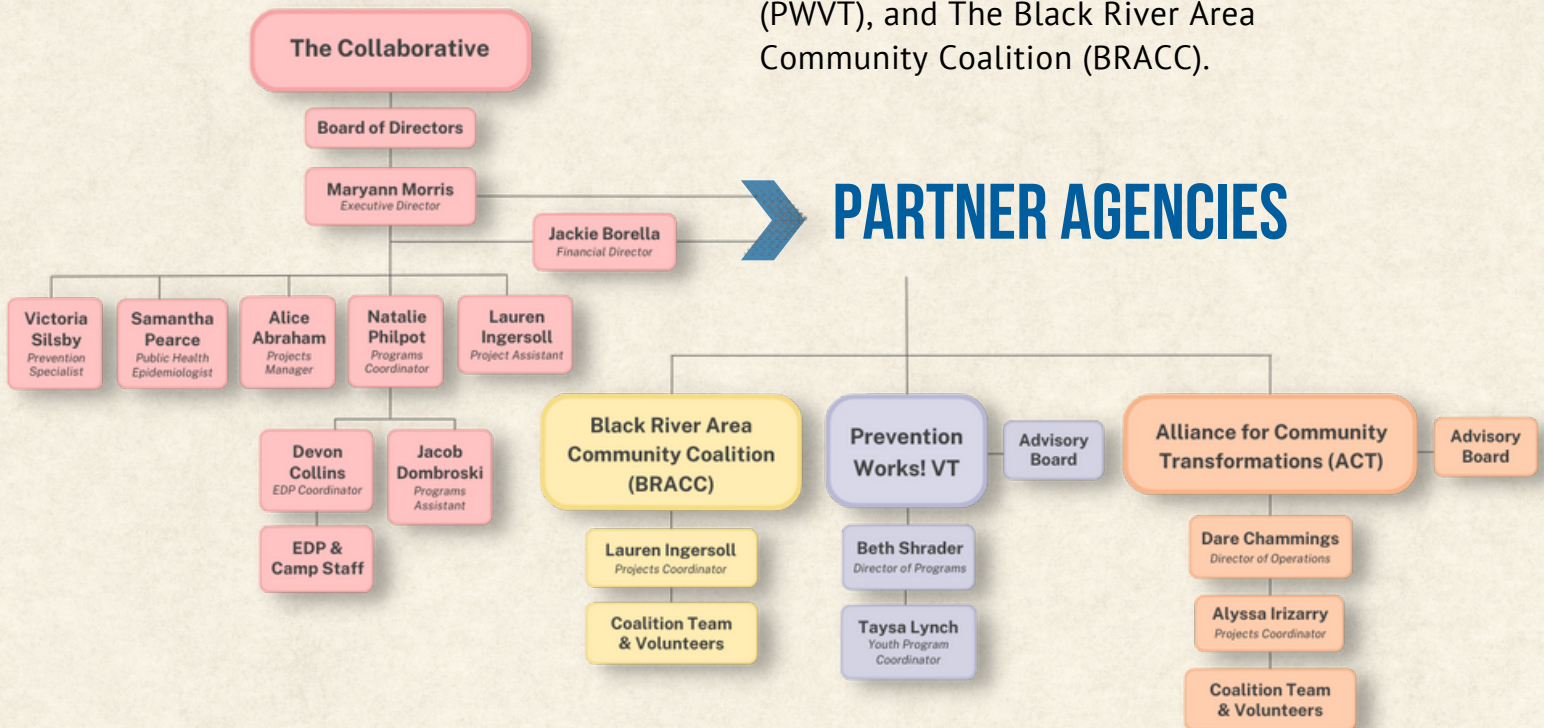

Introductory Letter from the Director



Responding to the needs of our community



EXTENDED DAY PROGRAM

The Collaborative provides licensed after-school childcare for Flood Brook students during the school year where kids can participate in playing games, crafting, hiking, fire-building, snowshoeing, and cross-country skiing.

Day Camp was back in action providing childcare for families over February break. We offered kindergartners and Flood Brook students of all ages a whole week of fun activities.

MENTORING PROGRAM

Thanks to MENTOR Vermont and supporters like you, we're able to continue nurturing the social, academic, and emotional growth of our students. **New and returning mentors matched with 10 mentees for another successful year**— and the overwhelming interest from parents has sparked a wave of enthusiasm, resulting in a waiting list for our program!



SUMMER CAMP

Upon receiving the Summer Matter's Grant in 2021, we were able to offer three weeks of our camp for free, making it more accessible to all families. This allowed us to spend more of our budget on enrichment activities, supplies, staff, and outreach to bring in community partners... **We had a record-breaking 50 kids in Summer Camp everyday!**

VERMONT EVERYONE EATS

During COVID, VEE provided meal assistance to residents, kept restaurants running, kept farmers supported, and kept workers employed. Thanks to all the amazing people who helped make this program a success! A big shout-out goes to all the restaurant staff who gave their time, the dedicated volunteers who showed up come rain or shine to distribute meals, and of course-- the generous support from donors like you.



Through our partnerships with The Manchester Food Cupboard & Shires Housing, over 35,000 meals were distributed to Bennington County residents between July 2021 and June 2022 through our restaurant partners:

Vermont lawmakers initially allocated funds from the COVID Relief Fund to launch VEE. The program was subsequently extended with FEMA funding and then with a 10% match from the State of Vermont. This program has been extended numerous times since the start of the pandemic but is slated to end at the end of March 2023.

As a distributor, this program has proved instrumental to many Vermonters in Bennington County, especially our older Vermonters and those with disabilities that prevent them from cooking their own meals. This includes the many homeless people in shelters, hotels and motels. It also was a savior to several in the area, who had emergency medical issues arise and no one to cook for them. GENDER SEXUALITY ALLIANCE CLUB

The GSA club had an outstanding attendance of 25 students meeting weekly to share the experiences of the LGBTQ+ community. Thanks to Mr. DesMarais and other school faculty “allies” who supported this student-led club for middle schoolers!

The Collaborative promoted LGBTQ+ youth reading lists at the Manchester Public Library’s Book Fest. The GSA selected books for the school library.

The LGBTQ Advisory co-sponsored Pride Fest in Bennington. ACT and The Collaborative marched in the Parade and tabled.



REFUSE TO USE PROGRAM

The Collaborative's Refuse To Use (RTU) program is a community and school-based series of educational substance misuse and asset-building events for students in grades 6-12. The program addresses the physical, mental, and social well-being of our youth by providing vetted programs, showcasing community involvement, and delivering a season pass from a local recreation sponsor as a healthy alternative.

MISSION-DRIVEN PROJECTS

Building a community of preventionists

The Collaborative represents prevention locally, regionally and at the state level.

Our campaigns and outreach focus on expanding the prevention infrastructure to show that everyone—including businesses, organizations, and towns—has a role in prevention through education, programming, environmental strategies, and policy development.

CHANGING SOCIAL NORMS

Through focus group discussions and surveys with young adults and parents of the Bennington County area, we learned that...

- Many young adults (ages 18-25) want to celebrate the fact that their peers do not drink or use substances.
- Parents want to hear about how other adults are connecting with their children and talking about making healthy choices.

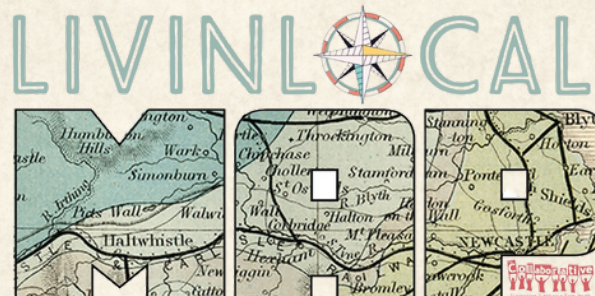
Print and social media-based campaigns were created along with digital resource blogs to bring these conversations around social norms to the forefront.

STRENGTHENING ACCESS TO LOCAL RESOURCES

The Livin' Local Map was launched as an interactive, digital resource map to help people locate hot spots for art, culture, sports, hobbies, and community services... Essentially, anything that makes you feel happy, healthy, and connected to the community.

Bennington County PD partnered with us to manage year-round Rx disposal boxes at four law enforcement properties, Southwestern VT Medical Center, and the pharmacy's two properties. YTD collection total is 5,550 lbs since 2017!

SUPPORTING LGBTQ+

LGBTQ+ Advisory focused on increasing health equity. The Advisory's successes include broadening the LGBTQ+ voice and access to services while reducing stigma.

Never Too Early Campaign: The Collaborative, as lead of the Green Peak Alliance (GPA), hosted Think Again workshops on LGBTQ+ Inclusion, specifically for staff and administrators at early childhood centers. We're sending the message that being valued by your community can make an enormous difference to a child and their family.

PROMOTING THE VALUE OF DEVELOPMENTAL ASSETS

Research done by the Search Institute shows that youth with more developmental assets engage in fewer risks, and more thriving behaviors. If we could support the development of these assets in youth in our communities, then we would not only be reducing their chance of engaging in risky behaviors like substance misuse but also help them to thrive and strengthen families.

Through our partnership with Green Peak Alliance, we created an easy-to-use media toolkit with simple messages and tips that can be used by anyone who has a connection with young people.

The Developmental Assets Media Toolkit, so far, has been shared with the school districts of Springfield, Windsor, Bellows Falls, Black River, Green Mountain School, and Hartford.

ADDRESSING YOUTH VAPING

We provided education to 950 parents, teachers, youth, healthcare professionals, and educators on vaping risks of harm, targeted advertising to youth, and cessation supports.

In addition to being a widespread health issue, vape devices are also hazardous waste— they contain explosive lithium batteries and toxic nicotine juice. Yet when schools confiscate the devices, they often end up in a box in staff offices, or worse, tossed in the trash.

The Collaborative researched how to provide a safe, easy to use state-wide system for whole device disposal, to empower students to quit vaping and participate in restorative justice, and how to update student handbook with cessation resources, environmental impact and peer support.

VERMONT, TOGETHER, WE CAN DO THIS!



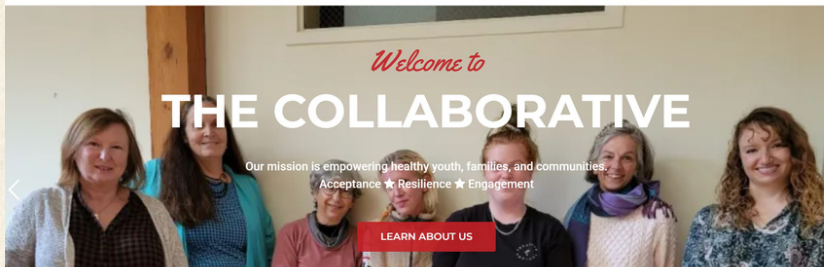
COLLABORATING WITH SCHOOLS ON WHOLISTIC APPROACHES

At a local high school serving approximately 777 students from 13 area towns, we provided technical assistance and coordination in support of their transition to a restorative justice response to student substance-related infractions.

This project included:

- Drafting a logic model outlining behaviors and related challenges; risks and protective factors; interventions; and short/long term goals.
- Creating procedural flowcharts for different infraction scenarios
- Exploring alternatives to suspension curriculum
- Incorporating requirements to meet with the school's dean, CRJ, and health departments
- Providing resources like Nicotine E-checkup and cessation kits.

So far, 25 students have participated in the restorative process, and the community library agreed to have staff trained as a cessation specialist of the ALA's NOT and INDEPTH youth cessation programs.



THE COLLABORATIVE LAUNCHES A NEW WEBSITE

If you visited our website last year, you may have noticed it has been completely revamped! We cleaned it up to make finding information easier than ever. We worked with Kerri MacLaury of Rural Techies, who built our previous website and served three years with us at The Collaborative.

Though the next stage of improving our website's accessibility is still in progress, we are excited about translating it into Spanish and hopefully more languages in the future.

We are grateful for all of your support in helping us make these important improvements to our foundation!



The goal we had in redesigning the website was increased accessibility. We simplified our written content, removing unnecessary words wherever possible, to reach more people at different reading levels. We used dyslexia-friendly text, selected a larger font size and used high-contrast color schemes to improve readability, especially for people with visual impairments. I've been so impressed with The Collaborative's commitment to improving accessibility in this regard, and know their clients will appreciate it, too.

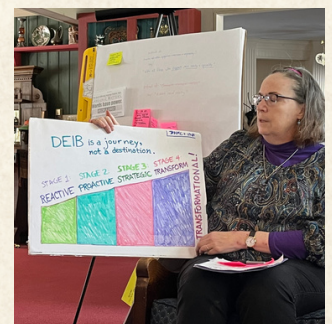
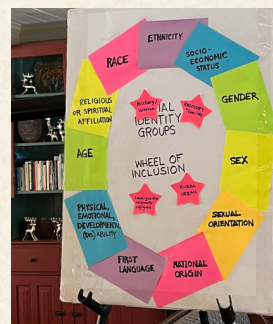

FISCAL PARTNER AGENCIES

Expanding our organizational capacity

The Collaborative is the fiscal sponsor for ACT Bennington, The Black River Area Community Coalition, and Prevention Works! VT.

Our organization helps its partner agencies focus on their core mission by managing financial and administrative functions on their behalf, providing grant management, administrative support, and risk management.



ACT BENNINGTON

ACT is a substance misuse prevention coalition focused on supporting youth in Bennington County through community engagement, education, advocacy, and healthy community design.



PREVENTION WORKS! VT

PWVT is part of a statewide substance misuse prevention community where Prevention Professionals, the Vermont Department of Health Prevention Consultants, and youth-serving organizations across the state are all working to create healthier communities.



BLACK RIVER AREA COMMUNITY COALITION

BRACC is a community-led, Ludlow-based prevention coalition developing programs and providing resources that support the youth of Ludlow, Plymouth, Mt. Holly and Chester.

BRACC JOINS THE COLLABORATIVE



For over 20 years, The Black River Area Community Coalition (BRACC) has been a collaboration of individuals, schools, health professionals, law enforcement, businesses, and local decision-makers.

The organization uses evidence-based strategies to collect data and build prevention programs that are responsive to the needs of the towns and school communities of Ludlow, Plymouth, Mount Holly and Chester. Following the retirement of its former Director, Paul Faenza, BRACC sought new oversight and found it in February of 2022 with an agreement with The Collaborative to be its fiscal and organizational sponsor.

BRACC's new Projects Coordinator, Lauren Ingersoll, was hired later that year through The Collaborative to rebuild BRACC's programs at the grassroots and reestablish its coalition team.



INCREASING HEALTH EQUITY

Take Care Project: Our goal is to expand youth access to free menstrual and personal care products. ACT helped schools stock up on soap, shampoo, deodorant, and tampons to support youth and families experiencing housing insecurity. We also partnered with Threads (a free store for teens at CRJ) to launch a personal wellness section called “The Refresh.”



In partnership with **Planned Parenthood of Northern New England**, we hosted a screening of *Pandora’s Box*, a film about period poverty, and engaged attendees in dialogue about how to build menstrual equity in Bennington.

YOUTH-LED INITIATIVES

Nearly 900 Sunshine Boxes were distributed between 2021 and 2022! These monthly take-home kits are filled with crafts, resources, and activities to help build resilience and normalize conversations about mental health and substance misuse. The project was launched by student leaders in 2021 and has continued thanks to community support and sponsorship.

The Youth Leadership Group organized a Community Dialogue Night featuring Alexina Federhen, Miss Vermont 2022 –the event was attended by school administrators, town leaders, local parents, and caring adults.

Our student leaders continue to take initiative and support their peers’ at Mt. Anthony Union Middle School (MAUMS) by:

- Participating in leadership trainings
- Building positive messaging campaigns
- Raising educational awareness at school and on social media
- Providing nicotine cessation support and suicide prevention resources to students

COMMUNITY HIGHLIGHTS

We’re thrilled to introduce **“The Space Place,”** a new after school club providing a safe space for youth to unwind, hang out with friends, and work on projects... it’s all about encouraging creative expression and positive relationships.

Grounded in the knowledge that Pride is Prevention, ACT continues to expand programming for LGBTQIA+ youth.

The annual Photovoice Contest theme “Brave Spaces” uplifted the experiences of our LGBTQIA+ youth and allies—four winning pieces were on display at The Left Bank, with a photography exhibit hosted by Queer Connect.

We were also pleased to participate in Bennington Pride with coalition members and The Collaborative!



A Cannabis Control Commission (CCC) is a municipal citizen board responsible for reviewing and licensing commercial cannabis establishments of all types to make sure that they comply with local zoning, sign, and public nuisance regulations. The local CCC is appointed or designated by the legislative body of the municipality (select board or trustees) and may be the legislative body itself.



The licensing authority the CCC has for commercial cannabis is comparable to the role that local liquor boards have to review liquor license applications and take action when violations of local license conditions occur.



CANNABIS CONTROL COMMISSION

A challenge in 2022 was finding the balance between advocating for youth cannabis use prevention and watching the adult retail cannabis market unfold.

The Vermont prevention community showed commitment to supporting the health and safety of youth through this critical time by:

- Working with local municipalities and towns on developing cannabis commissions
- Providing educational resources and curriculums to schools and youth allies
- Continuing to address the Cannabis Control Board rules

2022 CHAMPION AWARDS

Prevention Works! VT also recognized the contribution to the field by **reintroducing and celebrating the Prevention Champion Awards to nine deserving individuals and organizations.**

All of these accomplishments could not have been possible without the partnerships of the prevention coalition staff who volunteer for workgroups, the steering committee, roundtables and networking groups.



Prevention Works is the core to connecting the other prevention coalitions around Vermont. We appreciate the trainings, networking, and collaboration on strategies that help deliver thorough and consistent messaging throughout the state.

COLLABORATING ACROSS THE STATE

Prevention Works! VT continued to work diligently to educate state level decision makers about the value of substance misuse prevention organizations.

Our work groups addressed:

- Youth engagement and advocacy
- Marketing and communication strategies
- Alcohol and cannabis education/policy

In 2022, our coalition and partners were able to secure (for the first time) **\$3 million in the state budget for substance misuse prevention.**

Congratulations to all of us on the educational power of prevention voices!

During this time, the Steering Committee (composed of members from six prevention organizations including our fiscal agent, The Collaborative) extended their leadership to Prevention Works! VT.

Our staff and leadership would also like to acknowledge and thank the Vermont Department of Health Division of Substance Use Programs for their continued funding that allows us to support the prevention community and workforce.

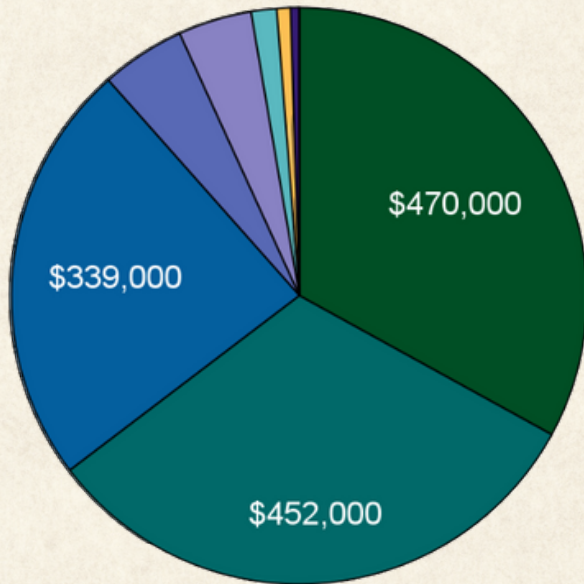
PREVENTION DAY 2022

The prevention community had an opportunity to celebrate in-person for the first time in a few years at Prevention Day 2022.

Held in conjunction with the OVX State House Rally, the turnout was incredible with the attendance of **70 youth from 11 high schools, 68 adults from 13 prevention coalitions, four state agencies and four other youth-serving organizations.**

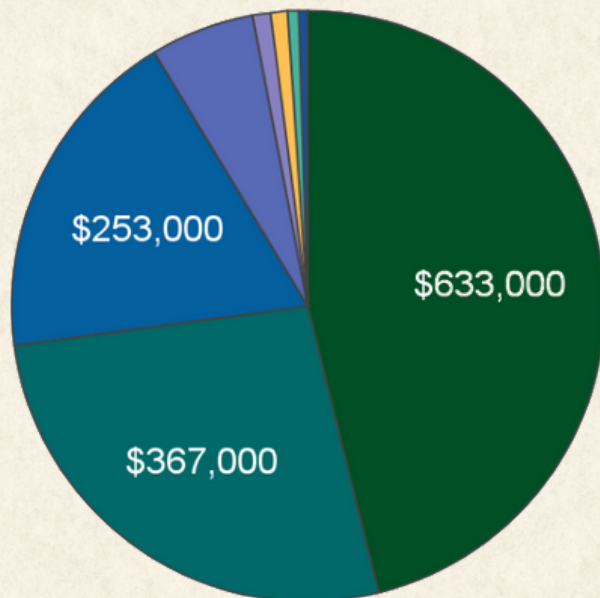
